11 Principles by Ashley Chalmers

According to Ashley Chalmers, there are 11 principles to know when laying out a vegetable garden:

- **1.** Have Patience: A great veggie garden takes time.
- **2. Start Small:** Even if you have a large plot, it's best to keep things manageable.
- **3. Mark Out Your Plot:** Vegetables need sunlight or buy seeds that tolerate some shade.
- **4. Pre-Plan Your Irrigation**: Vegetable plants require water. We are fortunate to have an ample supply of water.
- 5. Clear Your Soil of Stones & Weeds: Dong this and adding compost will ensure that your soil is of the highest quality possible.
- **6. Start With the Easiest Veggies:** A great start to your garden layout is easy-to-grow plants.
- 7. Plan A Sensible Vegetable Plot: The mature height and size of a plant is important to avoid overcrowding. When plants compete for soil nutrients, airflow, and sunlight you're welcoming in a variety of pests and diseases.
- 8. Pay Attention to Each Plants Individual Needs: The best ways to guarantee a garden's success is by treating each plant individually.
- 9. Include Natural Bug-Eaters In Your Layout: Certain flowers like Cosmos, Chamomile, Marigolds and others are great for controlling pests.
- **10. Maximize Biodiversity:** The right choice of plants can make your garden task easier.
- **11. Embrace the Journey:** It's all about learning and growing together.
